CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Being the affiliated institute, the college implements the curriculum prescribed by University of Nagpur. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the following process is developed and deployed. Plan for effective implementation of curriculum: • At the outset, the Principal of the college conducts meetings with the various head of the departments to develop strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum. • Teachers are encouraged to impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as presentations, assignments, discussions, workshops, seminars and industrial visits besides the regular/traditional chalk and talk methods. • We follow the academic calendar provided by the University which is circulated to all departments. In the beginning of the academic year, the college also prepares an academic calendar comprising of the entire schedule for the year. • Every faculty member prepares a teaching plan, showing month-wise topics to be taught. These plans depend upon the syllabus prescribed by the University and the number of lectures allotted by it. At the end of every month, the monthly monitoring sheets are prepared; showing the actual number of lectures engaged by every faculty member in the month. It is compared with the teaching plan, to find out whether there is any gap between the number of lectures planned and the number of lectures actually executed. It also shows the actions to be taken to cover up the gaps if any. • For effective implementation of the curriculum, the classroom teaching is also supplemented with seminars, projects and study tours. • The College effectively translates the curriculum through class room

teaching, seminars, workshops, innovative teaching practices such as LCD projectors, OHP, group discussions, etc. • The College has definite procedures like Teaching Learning Plans, Monthly Monitoring Sheets to ensure effective translation of curriculum. • Teaching faculties which are the members of Board of Studies of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj, Nagpur University, Nagpur, of various subjects, are participated in workshops, conducted jointly by the College and University Board of Studies to create awareness among teachers about the new curriculum. • The college provides ample books and other teaching and reference materials like journals, magazines, teaching models and software to enable its teachers to ensure effective delivery of curriculum. Also encourages its faculty members to participate in Orientation/ Refresher Courses/ Workshops/ Seminars organized by the University so as to update their knowledge and to improve the teaching practices. • The course files are evaluated by Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) with help of concerned senior subject teacher and HOD. IQAC monitors the academic activities on regular basis to ensure the execution of timetable. It also monitors execution of academic calendar and teaching learning process and finds the gap, if any. • The academic performance of students is continuously monitored by conducting unit tests, mock practical examinations during the semester. • Employing learner centric techniques such as assignments, peer learning, group discussion, brain storming, use of NPTEL lectures, case studies, projects, quiz etc., in the delivery of the academic courses.

Such a feedback is used to make modifications in the curriculum, infrastructural facilities, and utilized for overall development of the institution. • There is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback on curriculum, on teachers, on infrastructure facilities and on support services through feedback formats. • The feedback is obtained from different sources such as, from students, through parentteacher meet, alumni meet and academic peer visiting the college for practical examination or Ph.D. viva voce. • The curriculum designing and restructuring is essentially the responsibility of Rashtrsant Tukadoji Maharaj, Nagpur University, Nagpur. The college, however, provides valuable inputs to the process by way of seeking feedback. • Many teachers of the college have participated in preparation of curriculum of affiliating University. Many teachers are Members of Board of Studies and on subcommittees where they have given their valuable inputs based on the feedback received from students, to restructuring of the curricula. • Apart from this, some of the teachers have also given valuable inputs in restructuring of the curricula of other Universities. Some of the faculty members have participated in syllabus revision workshop organized by various colleges. • Students' feedback is obtained on teaching, course content, support services and individual teacher's performance. This feedback is taken at the end of final semester/year for all the programmes. • IQAC has been taking feedback from teachers on various aspects like annual reports of various committees, evaluation of teachers diary and attendance register. Any specific feedback/suggestions received are placed before the IQAC meetings for corrective measures from time to time. • Concern staff interacts informally with the students and suggestions given by them about laboratory/library services are considered and implemented. • Feed back is collected from the students and is analyzed to orient the teaching in such a way that average student attains the outcomes to an expected level. • The students evaluate the teachers by filling the feedback forms on teachers at the end of every academic session. Evaluation of teachers is done on knowledge, communication skill, presentation style, sincerity and commitment, regularity and punctuality, interest generated by the teacher, accessibility and availability and behaviour. IQAC committee under chairmanship of Honourable Principal analyzes the feedback form on teachers. After analysis, shortcomings are discussed with concerned teacher and suggestions are given to overcome the shortcoming. • The feedback from the stakeholders regarding the creation or renovation of infrastructural facilities is discussed in the meeting of IQAC. Then it is placed before LMC for approval. • Feedback is obtained from the students through personal discussion with the librarian and mentor teachers. Staff member also gives their opinion, if any for the improvement of library services of the college.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

 Ewaste management: Ewaste is given to recycling agency "Just dispose Recycling PVT limited" in order to safely dispose or recycle. This year 15 Kg. Ewaste was given to environmental friendly disposal. For this college has received a certificate of appreciation from the company. 2) Swaccha Bharat Abhiyan: Swaccha Bharat Abhiyan was carried on dated 2nd October 2018, in the college campus and second premises at Narsala Hostel. Large number of NSS students contributed their service and cleaned the area spreading awareness among the students and people about the importance of cleanliness for better and healthy life. 3) Dustbin plantation drive: The dustbin plantation drive was conducted in the college on dated 28th January 2019. Usually students litter the college just because they don't find proper place to dispose their garbage.

Therefore, this situation was tackled by setting up dustbin on every floor of the college. The members of Parents and Teacher Association donated dustbins for collection of garbage and waste material so that college premises remains clean and pollution free. 4) Plastic free campaign: This programme was conducted on 13 October 2018. In this campaign cloth bags were prepared and donated to grocery shop vegetable markets and to the teaching and nonteaching staff of the college to create awareness about plastic pollution and support ecofriendly environment for better future. The campus is made free from plastic accumulation. This awareness is created by the staff members among the students about the health hazards of these to the environment. The institution makes every effort towards green practices. 5) Garden of the college: The staff and students of the Department of Botany as well as the NSS committee of the college take care of college campus. There is a small Garden inside the college campus as well as there are many trees inside the campus. On each floor and in front of each department there are pots containing various types of saplings .They are regularly watered and the garden is also taken care and maintained regularly by the person incharge. 6) Guest Lectures: Various Guest lectures and environmental awareness programmes like World Forest Day, World water day, World Ozone Day and wild life celebration was organized in the college so that the students should understand the importance of environment.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practices of the Institution Best Practice No.1 1) Title of Practice: "Sewing and Embroidery Training Centre for Rural Women of Narsala Grampanchayat, District Nagpur. 2) Goal: To educate and train rural girls specifically college students and women to develop selfemployment and selfdependency. Objective of this project is to orient rural girl students about fabrics and practical knowledge of sewing and embroidery. 3) Concept of the practice: The College has planned to run this practice for economical development of poor women and girls. This practice specifically aims at the empowerment of rural women. Women in the rural areas face lot of financial problems. They are dependent on other people in the family for their development. The syllabus of this course helps to train the women in tailoring and embroidery techniques. The activities are entry activities to achieve the higher goals of social mobilization of women and women empowerment. Tailoring and embroidery has the keen interest of women as tailoring is booming business in India (at industrial level and particularly in garment industries). The primary object is to enable women to earn some income from tailoring activities. The secondary object is to establish social forums where women can freely discuss their issues and problems and also enhance other skills to improve their livelihood. 4) The Practice (With example of session 20182019): Dr. Mrs. N. A. Tiwade, Head, Department of Textile and Clothing and Dr. (Mrs.) H. A. Padole, Assistant Professor, Department of Textile and Clothing looked after the centre. These faculty members have drafted the theory and practical curriculum for participants. Total 22 students were admitted during 20182019 for the course. Rs.100/ per student was charged as fee. The training was started from 01/09/ 2018 for a period of three months from 12.00 noon to 03.00 pm. daily. Dr. Pravin Charde, Principal of Sevadal Mahila Mahavidyalaya, has provided full cooperation and allotted a room for training centre on hostel premises of the college at Narsala. Mrs. Sangeeta Gadekar was appointed to train the students and she taught as per prescribe syllabus. During this training the making of different types of garments like kurta, salwar, saree blouse, a line frock, petticoat, chudedar , shirt, nappy, etc. were taught at the centre. After completion of three month course, practical examination was conducted and certificates were distributed to the participants. The NGOs "Lions Club of Nagpur South and Lions Club Nagpur New Diamond" have supported

this practice. 5) Evidence of Success: The trained women are able to increase

their income with the help of this practice. Some of the women have taken loans from local banks and purchased their own sewing machine. By observing the success of this practice, Prof. Dr. Pravin Charde, Principal of Sevadal Mahila Mahavidyalaya, has decided to continue the practice with some changes adopted in the syllabus after getting the feedback from the trainees. The practice was successfully run by the Department of Textile and Clothing, of Home Science faculty of the college. www.sevadalmahilamahavidyalaya.ac.in E -mail: sevamahilamv@gmail.com Best Practices of the Institution Best Practice No.2 1) Title of Practice: "Bird Restaurant to save birds and save nature" in the Raj Bhavan Biodiversity park (Residence of Governor of Maharashtra State), District Nagpur. 2) Goal: To start BIRD RESTAURANT to save birds in particular and nature in general. Birds are the integral part of the ecosystem. In order to maintain ecological balance of the nature birds need to survive all the odds and beats. 3) The context: Due to the excessive deforestation and growing human encroachment, number of birds are depleting very fast as they struggle for food and proper shelter. Raj Bhavan premises having mainly three types of habitat, grassland, woody shrubs,

trees with a small water body. Plantation of many varieties of fruiting plants like berries and sandal wood trees was done in Raj Bhavan premises to increase the biodiversity and to provide ideal habitat for feeding and nesting the

birds. This has added to the beauty and greenery of Raj Bhavan. However this has resulted in the depletion of the grassland habitat and thereby affected the sources of food available to the grassland birds like peacocks, Partriges and francolins. Plantation of fruiting trees, drip irrigation in the premises and protection has attracted the more and more species of birds at Raj Bhavan. This has increased the species richness and abundance of birds in Raj Bhavan. Due to this there was an increased food demand by the grassland birds. Ptilochronology is the study of the bird's feathers. When we studied the shaded feathers of

these birds, we noticed that, these are facing the problems in getting the sufficient amount of food and these were not getting the complete nourishment. Thus this practice was aimed to provide food supplement to these birds to

improve the reproductive success of these grassland birds for increasing the abundance of these birds. 4) The Practice: Hon'ble Principal Prof. Pravin Charde has taken initiative by constituting the committee to start the Bird Restaurant at Raj Bhavan Nagpur. The convener of this practice is Dr.(Mrs.) S. M. Mandaogade, and others members are Dr. (Mrs.) H. A. Padole, Dr.(Mrs.) P. P. Chahande. These faculty members have taken support of other staff members,

students and alumni association of the college. The activity is carried out by collection of grains from Alumni, Teaching and Nonteaching staff members and stored in tin and air tight container. These collected grains then kept in earthen pot with water in the biodiversity park of Raj Bhavan. Recording of bird activities was done at Raj Bhavan premises by installing the CCTV cameras.

By noting the number of birds visiting at restaurant premises, the daily requirement of grains for these birds was calculated by the statistical analysis. Approximately 100 kg of mixed type of grains are donated to Raj Bhavan on monthly basis. 5) Evidence of Success: Richness in avian biodiversity

was noted as compared to the earlier studies after the start of bird restaurant. Bird restaurant has attracted the many species of birds in Raj Bhavan premises due to easy availability of food material. Not only the birds but small mammals like squirrels were reported to feed on these food grains. Total 154 species of the birds belonging to 71 genera were recorded from Raj Bhavan. Coffee table book was prepared along with the photographic evidences

and was submitted authorities of Raj Bhavan. Protected nesting sites, ideal feeding grounds, canopies of the large trees as a shelter, easy availability of water, natural habitat and supplementation of mixed food grains has increased the abundance of the birds in this area. The artificial nests were installed at Raj Bhavan area, which were occupied by the different species of the birds. Nests of the many birds like Shikra, Collared dove, Little brown dove, Yellow footed green pigeon, Pied myna, Rufous treepie, House crow, Black kite, Tailor bird, Baya weaver, White throated Munia, Grey partridge, Rose ringed parrot and Purple rumped sunbird were observed in large number in this premises. Nesting material like jute fibers were kept at the premises that helped the birds in building the nest. Increase in number of birds belonging to order Galliformes that are Indian Peafowl, Grey partridge and painted francolin was reported that signifies the reproductive success of these birds. Positive opinion is received from the staff of the Raj Bhavan Biodiversity Park (Residence of Governor of Maharashtra State) District Nagpur, from their feedback opinion. 6) Problems Encountered: Insufficient Collection of grains and lack of proper storage system in the college, thus prompt transportation of grains from college to Raj Bhavan is needed without delay. Previously there was no fencing at certain places from where the some dogs and other nuisance causing animals were entering the premises and were destructing the eggs as well as new youngones of grassland birds or eggs of those birds that lays their eggs on ground like Red watteled lapwing. The increased number of birds has increased the food grain requirement at the Raj Bhavan premises.
